“I’m lucky. I’m 16, live in a small town and I am a daughter of an immigrant. Growing in a small town, when 96 percent of the population is white is tough. You turn white. Sure, the color of my skin will never be the color of a piece of printer paper but inside it feels like I’m all white. I guess the word “anchor baby” defines me.... sort of. I’m the president of debate club, where we talk about bills, current news topics, and political nominees. The hardest topic... Is immigration reform. People are so uninformed.. “Yes I believe we should deport all undocumented immigrants here, and they should get in line with all the other people to get their papers... LEGALLY” I find that easier said than done. I haven’t seen my father since I was 8 and only spoken to him on the telephone. He was deported in 2009. The last day I saw him was in a train station... And I had no idea why I was saying good bye... and why everyone was crying. When my friends came over and asked where my father was I said he was “working”. Every year on my birthday he calls me and I try hard not to cry because I know it’s another year of him not being able to see me grow. My mother is a single mom. Terrified of being deported. Just a couple weeks ago she was caught. She was driving to work when a police officer pulled her over because she wasn’t wearing her seat belt. For anyone else it’s just a ticket. For a single mother that is illegal it’s “I have to go to court, I have to show identification... They will find out I am illegal.. I will be deported... I have to call my lawyer... Who will take care of my daughters?” I hate seeing my mother in constant fear. I hate hearing family members and friends calling us to be careful because in Hudson ICE was seen deporting families. She’s scared. I’m scared. We’re all scared. Living the American dream shouldn’t consist of being scared every second of the day.

Task 1

(written in simple present, he/she/it + s, simple past used when writing about past experiences of Camila; Gerunds (-ing forms) used to shorten sentences)

The autobiographical article at hand **is** about a female Argentinian immigrant named Camila. She **describes** her struggles and fears **facing** the status as an illegal immigrant in the USA. **Coming** to the US when she **was** seven, Camilla **profited** from a special program (*DACA*) which **gave** her a status as a legal immigrant for some years. Camila **became** part of the American society and **graduated** with a self-paid bachelor's degree. Camilla **feels** as an equal hard-working American but after **quitting** the DACA program, she **lives** in constant fear of being deported.

Task 2

Consequences for Camila:

- she lives illegally in America
- she has to fear deportation
- as her brother was deported 7 years ago, she might be next
- she continues living in fear as there is no security for her to let her stay in the U.S.
- Camila might have to work and live "undercover" as long as Trump's immigration policy is active

Task 3

The given article is clearly a **first-person narrator**, as you can see by using "I" many times. This offers us readers to get to know her *feelings* and *thoughts*. We are able to read about her feelings, for example she lives in fear of deportation (line 2f.). Also, we get to know her thoughts as she points out that it is "disheartening to feel the President doesn't support the Dreamers" (l. 13f.).

Furthermore, we also just *get to know what the character knows*. **Therefore**, Camila tells the reader she does not know if she will ever see her brother again (l. 5).

Finally, the *protagonist creates empathy* with us readers. Multiple times, Camila points out that she is not a criminal, e.g. she never even had a traffic violation, pays her taxes as anyone else or most importantly she connects with mostly an American reader that the U.S. is the only home she has ever known. This proves that she wants the readers to understand her feelings, emotions and situation.
